

Bishop's Statement on the appointment of a Vicar for the Parish of St Luke's, Bricket Wood

St Luke's, Bricket Wood, is a warm and welcoming church family who, after a successful and loving ministry of their previous incumbent, are ready for the next season in their life together. During the previous incumbent's ministry there was a period of healing from a difficult time and as we look forward now there are good foundations on which to build. During my conversations with the PCC one of the features of the church in recent years was described to me as a spiritual awakening, particularly among men.

Bricket Wood is a very defined geographical community which is mainly residential with an opportunity for the church to play a significant part in community life. This has already begun to be realised through the 'take a break' coffee mornings. However, there is inevitably more that could be done, particularly in terms of engaging with families.

This would be an ideal post for someone with energy and a heart for getting stuck into community life. It would suit someone who is in their early stages of ministry, maybe coming from a curacy, or someone who is searching for where God might be calling them to serve next.

St Luke's offers a huge amount of potential with a loving church family to work with. I hope that you enjoy reading their profile and are able to prayerfully discern whether this might be where God is calling you to serve.



FROM THE BISHOP OF HERTFORD

Some specific matters:

1. After extensive consultation, the Diocese is focused at this time on “Living God’s Love” (www.livinggodsllove.org) . We are asking every benefice to address three themes: Going Deeper into God; Transforming Communities; Making New Disciples, alongside ‘Growing younger and more diverse’. Of course, all our benefices are free to approach these themes in the way that seems right to them under God. But any priest accepting this post will commit himself or herself to engage with this initiative and to work with the people of the benefice to make sense of it in the life of the local church.
2. Within “Living God’s Love” every priest is expected to work with their lay and ordained colleagues in the construction of a Mission Action Plan. Mission Action Planning is a tool to help each benefice listen to the communities in which it is set and to identify ways in which the Church can grow. The Benefice has previously engaged with this process and I shall look to the Vicar to carry the process forward. Further information is available on the Living God’s Love website.

3. As a Diocese we are committed to developing the ministry of all God’s people. Any priest wishing to come and serve here will therefore be working collaboratively with ordained and lay colleagues. A key part of his or her ministry will be to identify and encourage those who have the calling and the gifting to be ordained or to be lay leaders.
4. The spiritual and numerical growth of the Church is a priority for the Church of England and for the Diocese. We will help and support any new post-holder in the Diocese as they work to secure this growth in depth and in numbers, and we will act in partnership with them to ensure that they have the necessary training and equipping for this vital part of their task.

6. The Diocese takes seriously the call on the Church of England to serve all the people of this land and in particular to be there for any who may need us at significant moments of transition in their lives. For this reason, we expect our clergy to be wholehearted in their exercise of the “cure of souls” to all within their parish, and to take responsibility for the provision of the pastoral offices to any who request them.
7. The parish is generous in its giving and contributes its Parish Share in full. I would be looking to the Vicar to continue a sustainable financial position, teaching regularly on the principles and practice of Christian stewardship and availing himself or herself of the diocesan and other resources available for this purpose.
8. Safeguarding children and vulnerable adults is a priority of the Diocese, as it is of the whole Church. The clergy of the Diocese receive regular training in this area, and anyone coming into the Diocese will commit themselves to undertake to keep up to date with their safeguarding training.
9. St Albans Diocese makes the well-being of our clergy, and lay ministers and officers, a very high priority. We have support in place for our clergy including Support in Your Ministry (SIM) scheme, Clergy Counselling, Dispute Advisory Service, training, regular reviews with senior clergy, and more. We encourage any priest coming to St Albans Diocese to access this support.



THE CHURCH

St Luke's Church in Bricket Wood is a vibrant, supportive, community that values fellowship, spiritual growth, and active participation in the life of the local community.

Services at St Luke's Church are live-streamed, making them accessible to a wider audience. Music before, during and after the services features a great range of contemporary songs and more traditional hymns. Leading of worship is informal, generally without traditional robes, creating a relaxed and welcoming atmosphere for worship.

Our worship takes many formats; it is lively, thoughtful, prayerful, sometimes free of formality, other times using more structured resources. Sunday worship is based around Common Worship using The New International Version of the Bible. Wednesday morning worship is a combination of the Book of Common Prayer and Common Worship and is spoken.

We are delighted to welcome to our Sunday services residents and carers from The Kestrels, our local care home for younger adults with physical and learning disabilities or sensory impairments.


HOW WILL WE GET THERE?

COMMUNITY OUTREACH & MISSION

Here is a flavour of how St Luke’s is active in our community:

Tenterden House Service	<i>An informal service held monthly at our local care home</i>
Warm Space	<i>A communal warm room in the halls complex with free tea and coffee-making facilities available for anyone struggling to stay warm in their own homes</i>
Take a Break	<i>A free monthly coffee morning utilising our Tea point in church. Regularly attracts around 30, the majority of whom are not regular church attendees</i>
Messy Church	<i>Sunday afternoon sessions with craft sessions and a story held every 6-8 weeks. Typically attracts between 5 and 30 children to each session (plus adults!)</i>
Home Groups	<i>A group meeting mainly fortnightly with an average attendance of 6 per meeting</i>
Lunch Club	<i>Our local senior citizens meet every two weeks in term-time to enjoy a hot meal together. We also hold Easter, Harvest and Christmas senior citizens’ services followed by a delicious tea served in the hall</i>

Men's Meal

A gathering of St Luke's men and their friends for breakfast or dinner, conversation and fellowship, every 6-8 weeks

Ladies' Lunch

A Saturday gathering of ladies and their friends for lunch at a local garden centre (every 6-8 weeks)

Doctor's Surgery

Located in the halls complex

Pre-School

Based in the halls complex four days a week

Community Choir

Around 40 members who use our church for practice weekly and often enhance our major festival services

Christmas Fair and Community Christmas Tree

We run a popular community Christmas craft fair, and community carol service with carols around the Christmas tree on the green outside the church

Prayer Chain

Co-ordinated mechanism that operates via email to bring prayer requests and concerns to bring the congregation together in prayer and supplication

THE LOCALITY, THE PARISH AND BEYOND

Bricket Wood is a growing village with a population of approximately 4,500. It is situated near St Albans in Hertfordshire. It forms an island separated from St Albans (5 miles to the north) by the M25 motorway and from Watford (5 miles to the south) by the M1 motorway.

The civil parish of St Stephen covers Bricket Wood, Chiswell Green and Park Street. The Parish Centre is on the edge of Bricket Wood. There is also a large recreational area 2 miles away at Greenwood Park, with sports facilities and a large meeting hall.

A significant proportion of the regular attendees at services live outside the parish, with 61% of electoral roll members living within the parish itself.

HISTORY

Until the 1920s, Bricket Wood was a countryside retreat to which many Londoners came to enjoy the fairgrounds. During the 1920s several naturist communities developed, and there are still two in the village. In the 1930s many bungalows were built around the area, and the Church was built in 1937. However, the greatest housing development in the village took place in the 1960s. Since that time most property development has been by infilling.


COUNTRYSIDE

Bricket Wood has retained a rural atmosphere, with areas of woodland and nearby farmland. It is just 3 minutes' walk from the Vicarage to the woods, which are part of Bricket Wood Common: a large area of common land with a wealth of natural history including rare butterflies and a network of footpaths and bridleways. It is great for a leisurely stroll, cycling, exercising dogs or enjoying walks with family and friends. There are beautiful ancient woodlands and countryside on the doorstep.

FACILITIES

Local shops include a pharmacy, post office, café, hairdressers and four convenience stores, an estate agent, takeaways, an Indian restaurant, an award-winning station café, dentist and doctors - all 2 minutes away from the Vicarage. There is a wonderful new skate park and play park in the village. There are major shopping centres, hospitals, cinemas and leisure centres in the large nearby towns of Watford, St Albans and Hemel Hempstead.

The Building Research Establishment (BRE) is within the parish. There are several small service industries some of which are home-based. Most employment is outside the village, with many people commuting to London or elsewhere. There are many village organisations covering a wide range of leisure activities, and uniformed organisations for the children. There is a Social Club and two Public Houses. St Luke's members also support the Local Residents Association, and many of the diverse local societies. Our halls complex is the centre of much of the activity within the community.

The popular [Warner Bros Studio Tour - The Making of Harry Potter](#) is on our doorstep in nearby Leavesden.





ST ALBANS

St Albans is an historic city built around the Cathedral and Abbey Church of St Alban, Britain's first Christian Martyr, whose tomb still stands at the centre of the building. In the nearby main street, an open air market is held twice a week, and also plays host to an antiques market once a month as well as occasional farmers' markets. There is a myriad of coffee shops and interesting places to eat, a theatre, Alban Arena concert and exhibition venue, a large modern sports centre with swimming pool, spa and gym. The city boasts of having the most pubs per square mile than anywhere else in the country!


VERULAMIUM

Down the hill from the Abbey is Verulamium Park, the site of a large Roman town, of which significant remains still survive, and artefacts can be viewed in the museum. The park has a lake where you can see swans and migrating Canada geese and feed the ducks! It has a play park and a splash park in the summer. Besides the sporting facilities, there are regular park runs and an annual music festival in the summer time to enjoy. It's a great place to take visitors.

WATFORD

To the southwest of Bricket Wood lies Watford, a large town with a major indoor shopping centre and all the usual amenities you would expect. As well as the Vicarage Road football stadium - the home of Watford FC - the town has the Palace Theatre and also the renowned Watford Colosseum concert venue. Both Watford and St Albans have excellent public transport links into London including fast train services.

SCHOOLS

There is a wide choice of good state and private schooling in the area. Within Bricket Wood there are JMI and Nursery schools, as well as privately run playgroups. Secondary schools are nearby, with good transport links.

TRANSPORT LINKS

We're very close to Junction 6 of the M1 and Junction 21a of the M25. There are bus links to St Albans, Watford, Hatfield, Luton and fast bus services to central London, Heathrow and Luton airports. Bricket Wood has its own station 15 minutes' walk from the vicarage with a shuttle train to St Albans and Watford where you can join the main line to London or the North.

DEMOGRAPHICS

The Census of 2021 showed that the population was 4,627 people. It is anticipated that these figures are set to rise. This consists of 2,248 males, 2,395 females. 2,622 are 18-64, 1098 are 65 and over. 2,019 identify as Christians. You can see more census data [here](#).



THE DEANERY

The St Albans Deanery comprises sixteen parishes, diverse in churchmanship, but with mostly vibrant and lively congregations. Named after the first English martyr, St Albans is a very spiritual place, with an above average proportion of people attending church in the area.

The Deanery was enlarged from nine parishes to the present number in 2012. That has changed the dynamics of the deanery but opened up new possibilities for the support of one another and for promoting the diocesan vision of Living God's Love. The Deanery Synod is actively engaged in developing a vision and plans for supporting the mission and ministry of the parishes it serves.

The Deanery Chapter meets six times a year for fellowship and prayer for the clergy. The Rural Dean is committed to developing the life of the Deanery and Chapter, providing mutual support and encouragement to its members.

THE CHURCH

St Luke's Church in Bricket Wood is an attractive building that serves as a welcoming sanctuary for all. The congregation is known for being caring, and supportive, embracing individuals of all ages and abilities with open arms.

The church is deeply involved in the local community, hosting regular events such as the Christmas craft fair, Christmas Tree light switch on, Take a Break (community coffee mornings), and the Lunch Club. These activities provide opportunities for fellowship and connection, as well as The Warm Space for anyone to use and have a hot drink. Refreshments are also served after the Sunday Service, fostering a sense of community and togetherness.

THE CHURCH BUILDING & THE HALLS

St Luke's Church is unique. It is a timber-framed building erected in 1937 as a Mission Church/village hall for the newly expanding village. It was made in Canada, flat-packed and shipped to the UK and then put together on site. Originally it was a multi-purpose hall that divided into various sized 'rooms' or expanded into a single area with a sprung dance floor.

The main church has removable seating and is a very flexible space. We have comfortable seating for 160 that can be arranged to suit the occasion. We have all our services in the church as well as using it for social functions. We have a two-manual electronic organ, a Yamaha keyboard and drums.

In more recent years, a halls complex has been added and improved, most recently with a tea point to facilitate serving of refreshments.

The halls complex, which is entered from the car park in The Crescent, consists of a good-sized lobby, a main hall, the Warm Space, a prayer room and toilets. A side corridor leads to the church office and the kitchen. A further suite of three rooms is used as the Doctors' Surgery. Their waiting room is shared as another medium sized meeting room when not in use for the surgery. The halls complex has a further corridor linking it to the main church building.










THE VICARAGE

The Vicarage is a 4-bedroomed detached house on a pleasant road, West Riding, only 3-4 minutes' walk from the Church.

On the ground floor is a large kitchen, two good-sized reception rooms, a cloakroom with toilet as well as a large study separated from the main family accommodation.

On the first floor are three well-sized and one smaller bedroom, separate upstairs toilet and a family bathroom with bath and separate shower cubicle.
