SUGGESTIONS FOR GOOD ZOOM ENGAGEMENT

- Please participate, don't just observe Pop things in Chat, ask questions (use virtual hand or just dive in with a question), contribute your best insights.
- **Set aside distractions** Close down other programmes, resist the temptations of your phone/tablet, put out of reach other reading material.
- **Keep your video on throughout** It will help you be fully present, and will help others engage with you. A blank screen is rather dispiriting.
- **Don't mute your sound** It helps with the flow of interaction, and an occasional background noise actually makes it feel less artificial. However, if there is a lot of noise in your room, or you are meeting as a group in one place, please do mute.
- **Combat Zoom fatigue** Two things will help combat weariness. Hide your self view (right click on your own image and select hide self view) and take regular stretch breaks (every 20 minutes or so stand up, stretch, take a few deep breaths).
- **Be patient** At some point something will go wrong. Please be patient with us as we try to sort it out.

GUIDELINES FOR GOOD INTEREACTION

- Learning together We are all here to learn from God and one another. Adopt a learning posture.
- Participate Share your thoughts, insights and questions. Listen carefully to what others say. Have an enquiring mind. You'll get the most out of it if you do.
- **Confidentiality** What is said in the room cannot be shared outside the room attributed to anyone in the room. That makes it a safe place for us to be honest and share more deeply. **Choose honesty and openness**.
- Reality check It is always easy to become disconnected from reality in a training session, so please keep us connected with reality by taking us back to how things really are in your context. Keep grounded.
- Next step We will cover a lot of ground, but throughout our time togetherbe
 attentive to what might be your next step following this morning's session. We
 will give you a chance to identify that at the end of the morning.

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




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FOUR OBSERVATIONS

Mission map of England (see pages 5-6).




4. HOME AND SCHOOL ARE THE FRONTLINE OF CONNECTION

Breakdown of Categories

Out of six million regular church attenders (11% of population)...

CORE ANGLICAN

- 200,000 (0.36% of the population).
- More likely to be female.
- Older than average population.
- Likely to attend weekly or biweekly.
- Has leadership role in church.
- Prayer and Bible is important.
- Society should be rooted in Christian values.
- Want to make a difference.

REGULAR ANGLICAN WORSHIPPER

- 1,000,000 (1.8% of the population).
- More likely to be female.
- Older than average population.
- Likely to have been part of Christian family.
- Likely to attend church less frequently than core.
- Faith is important to them.
- Part of 6m regular worshippers (11% pop).
- 19% believe in God and have no doubts (BSA).

Within the rest of the population...

CULTURAL FRINGE

- 10,000,000 (18% of the population).
- Grew up with some church experience at home/school.
- Tend to believe in God or God force.
- Faith not figure in day-to-day life, but may self identify as Christian/Anglican.
- Likely to attend Christmas service, Cathedral service or life events.
- Views church role to help society and provide moral basis.
- Group declining the quickest 'neither religious or non religious' .
- 6.6m regard themselves as Anglicans, down from 18.4m in 1983 (BSA)

INDIFFERENT TO CHRISTIAN CHURCH

- 11,000,000 (20% of the population).
- Not religious and don't go to church.
- · Church is old fashioned and not for me.
- Faith does not figure in day-to-day life, but may self identify as Christian.
- Not hostile to Christians or faith but it doesn't register for them.
- 88% of population are positive or neutral about Christians (BSA).
- Church has a role to serve the poor and vulnerable, and still has impact.

DIMISSIVE OF CHRISTIAN CHURCH

- 23,000,000 (42% of the population).
- Rise of the 'nones' (37.2% in 2021, up from 25.2% in 2011).
- Very wary of religious control.
- Tolerance and acceptance is key.
- This group is growing the fastest.
- 14.3m don't believe in God (4.9m in 1998) BSA.
- 9.9m are agnostic.
- Prefer to be called non-religious than atheist.
- Top three values are family, friendship and freedom (University of Kent).

ONS Census 2021 for England and Wales

- 46.2% of population indicate Christian (down from 59.3% in 2011).
- No religion 37.2% in 2021 (up from 25.2% in 2011).
- 10.7% indicate other religion (up from 9% in 2011).
- Muslims 3.9m (up from 2.7m in 2011).
- Hindus 1m (up from 818,000 in 2011).
- Sikhs 524,00 (up from 423,000 in 2011).
- Jewish 271,000 (up from 265,00 in 2011).
- Buddhist 273,000 (up from 249,00 in 2011).
- Other religion 348,00 (up from 240,000 in 2011).
- 6.0% didn't answer religion question (down from 7.1% in 2011).

IDEA 2: CONNECT WITH YOUR LOCAL SCHOOLS



If you are not sure where to start, start by blessing them! Ask: 'Is there anything we can help with?'

WORKING WELL WITH YOUR SCHOOL

GOLDEN PRINCIPLES TO REMEMBER

- 1. It is all about relationships not programmes or activities.
- 2. 'What do you need?'/'How can we help?' are powerful questions for both church and school to ask each other.
- 3. Think through a pathway to spiritual development together what can you offer and what can you signpost to? NB 'spiritual development' is something all schools must provide. It's part of the Ofsted SMSC agenda.
- 4. Simply blessing one another is a good place to start.

THINKING ABOUT YOUR INVESTMENT

As you look to invest in this partnership, it is worth remembering that churches and schools have very different priorities, though much of their work overlaps. It is helpful to let the Head Teacher be in the driving seat - they may be worried that the church is coming in with an agenda to convert everyone and that the church might behave in ways that are inappropriate in a school context.

Useful national organisations include:

- Prayer Spaces in Schools.
- Transforming Lives for Good Their 'early Intervention' mentoring scheme is very popular with schools but takes significant volunteer commitment.
- Open the Book Support for bringing Bible stories to life in school contexts.
- Centre for Chaplaincy in Education.

In order to get the most from any of the above, consider:

- Does it enhance the partnership between church and school (rather than the relationship between the school and an external group)?
- Does it promote a school-church relationship (rather than being a Head/Vicar activity)?
- Does it open other opportunities for ongoing spiritual development (or is it a 'one hit wonder')?
- How does this support a pathway to faith?
- Does it empower or disempower the church community?
- What about the wider family beyond the child is there a way to include them?
- Are church services and activities easy for new children and families to access?

There is an almost unlimited number of possibilities for how to partner well together. Check out this link for some ideas to inspire you in your context.



IDEA 3: HELP CHILDREN WITH KEY TRANSITIONS

IDEA 4: NURTURE FAITH IN THE HOME

These commandments that I give you today are to be on your heart. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up.

Deuteronomy 6:6-7

When asked what stops them from focusing on faith at home, parents listed the top five reasons as:

- Family time devoted to other activities: 32%.
- Not having enough time to spend with my child: 30%.
- Needing help knowing what to do: 24%.
- Worrying I'll do it wrong or put them off: 23%.
- Thinking I'm not a good enough example: 18%.
