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SUGGESTIONS FOR GOOD ZOOM ENGAGEMENT

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Dwelling in the Word is a process that many people are using to listen to Scripture, to each other and to God. It's not about sharing information or seeking scholarly answers or even the right answers to the issues raised in the text, but it is about listening well to one another and discerning what God is up to amongst us.

We invite the Holy Spirit in prayer to open our ears, hearts and minds. We listen to the passage read out loud and notice where our attention is drawn – a verse, phrase or single word. We then remain in silence for a minute or two, staying with the place in the passage that stood out for us.

JOHN 4:4-14 (THE MESSAGE)

⁴⁻⁶To get there, he had to pass through Samaria. He came into Sychar, a Samaritan village that bordered the field Jacob had given his son Joseph. Jacob's well was still there. Jesus, worn out by the trip, sat down at the well. It was noon.


⁷⁻⁸ A woman, a Samaritan, came to draw water. Jesus said, "Would you give me a drink of water?" (His disciples had gone to the village to buy food for lunch.) ⁹ The Samaritan woman, taken aback, asked, "How come you, a Jew, are asking me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" (Jews in those days wouldn't be caught dead talking to Samaritans.) ¹⁰ Jesus answered, "If you knew the generosity of God and who I am, you would be asking *me* for a drink, and I would give you fresh, living water."

¹¹⁻¹²The woman said, "Sir, you don't even have a bucket to draw with, and this well is deep. So how are you going to get this 'living water'? Are you a better man than our ancestor Jacob, who dug this well and drank from it, he and his sons and livestock, and passed it down to us?"

¹³⁻¹⁴ Jesus said, "Everyone who drinks this water will get thirsty again and again. Anyone who drinks the water I give will never thirst—not ever. The water I give will be an artesian spring within, gushing fountains of endless life."

Space for your word, phrase, or verse...

- 1 Listen to each person say what they heard in the passage in a particular verse, phrase or even single word. They may mention something they'd never heard before, something odd or something comforting, or something about which they'd like to find out more about. Listen well to what the person is saying, and what God might be saying through each person to your group.
- What is God is saying to you as a group today from the themes arising in the whole group. Ask one member of the group to post your themes to the Jamboard using the QR code on the screen or link in the Chat.




• In our gathered life as church.



NURTURE INTEREST

- Stage 1 Nurture interest through prayer, love, service, building connection with life interests and issues.
- **Stage 2** Nurture their experience of faith through 1-to-1 bible reading, nurture courses (Alpha, Christianity Explored, Start, Pilgrim), and contact with the wider church community.

ENCOURAGE COMMITMENT

At what age do practising Christians come to faith?



NOURISH GROWTH

- Stage 1 Early growth in faith as baptised and initiated into faith and the faith community.
- Stage 2 Ongoing growth (normal times and when struggling), and specific growth (involved in serving/ministry).

Think small activities (putting information on the church notice board) as well as big (running a Messy Church), and be specific and detailed in identifying the different aspects of some activities that might do different things (ie a Sunday service has many aspects to it).

The category at the end of the grid (Trellis work, the name comes from a book called <u>The Trellis and the Vine</u>) is a catch all for the activities that support the disciple making process, just as a vine needs to be supported by a trellis in order for it to grow healthily.

When you have done the mapping, reflect on:

- Where are your strengths and how could you build on those?
- Where are the gaps, and what could be done about those?

You won't have time to finish this activity during this session, so aim to set aside some time when you next meet to continue it, or ask two or three people to complete it ahead of your next meeting.

Be ready to share some of the things you have learnt through the exercise.

Transitions

Perhaps the hardest part of encouraging people on the journey to and of faith are the transition points between the various stages. Here are some ideas to help people cross these transitions.

FROM RAISING AWARENESS TO INITIAL CONTACT

- Have appropriate contact details on any raising awareness materials (for example, website, QR code, social media) and make the invitation for people to contact you attractive.
- Be clear about what you offer as a church that would be of interest to people. Connect with people's needs.
- Equip the congregation to 'own up' to their faith in everyday circumstances so that they both raise awareness and become the initial contact point for people.

FROM INITIAL CONTACT TO BUILDING CONNECTION

- Look for ways to serve, bless and connect those you have contact with. For example in the gathered life of the church, a men's curry night, a group for those who are bereaved, a retirement group, a youth group. Or on people's frontlines, going out of our way to serve, bless and connect with people by asking them for a coffee, assuring them of our prayers for their ill relative, bringing in a birthday cake to celebrate their birthday.
- Ensure the initial contact is warm, welcoming and relational, not cool, aloof and bureaucratic. For example, if someone approaches the church about a wedding, rather than say here is a form to fill in, congratulate them and invite them to tell you their story of how they came together.
- If someone attends a service, make sure the welcome doesn't just happen at the door when they walk in, but continues through the service and at the end (see Bob Jackson and George Fisher's materials <u>Everyone</u> <u>Welcome</u>).
- Create connecting events around life issues or interests. For example, a wine tasting evening, a barn dance, a parenting course, a dealing with anxiety online course or <u>Kintsugi wellbeing group</u>.
- Invite people to join you in serving others. For example, helping with your foodbank, a litter pick/ street tidy, the PA at services, a foreign missions trip.

FROM BUILDING CONNECTION TO SHARING GOOD NEWS

- Equip people to ask questions that open up the possibility of faith conversations (see <u>our guide</u> on this).
- Equip people to tell their story of how they came to faith, and to be able to introduce it into everyday conversations.
- Resource people through embedding the resource faith-sharing practice into church life (see session 5 workbook).
- Utilise festivals as inviting opportunities.

 Ensure there is a 'discovery opportunity' constantly available where people can find out more about the Christian faith. For example Hope Explored, or Life Explored

FROM SHARING GOOD NEWS TO INITIATE INTO FAITH AND COMMUNITY

- Be sure to ask people to becomes disciples of Jesus regularly in normal Sunday services. For example, as part of your preaching, when inviting people to receive communion, when advertising baptism or confirmation opportunities.
- Ensure there is a 'maternity ward' where people can come to faith in Christ. For example, an Alpha or Christianity Explored course.
- Find appropriate ways to mark people becoming disciples of Jesus. For example, a gift from the church that is given to anyone who does this; an invitation to join the Minister/elders to celebrate in some small way; a welcome at a service, perhaps marked by prayer and liturgy.
- Invite them to join something that will be a place of growth for them.

FROM INITIATE INTO FAITH AND COMMUNITY TO GENERAL GROWTH

- Develop a growth mindset. For example, talk abut all Christians have an L plate on, learner. Model it in your own life.
- Create a growth library of resources (online and physical) that people can borrow. Be sure to include visual, audible and verbal. Let people know about courses that are run elsewhere, especially online.
- Create growth groups, ideally short (three or four sessions) around particular themes. For example, Bible, prayer, spiritual disciplines, justice, giving, sharing-faith.
- Provide places for people who are struggling to receive support and care.

FROM GENERAL GROWTH TO SPECIFIC TRAINING

- Develop a serve mindset. All Christians are called to serve, both in the gathered and scattered aspects of church life.
- As much as possible, start with people not roles. Find out about their gifts, passions, interests, experience, calling. Try to provide ministry opportunities related to these.
- Create 'trial' opportunities so people can dip their toe in the water and see what it is like. Invite individuals to have a go.



Practise the Practices

Practice 1: Pray for Five

Take a few minutes to talk about how it is going praying for your five people who as yet aren't disciples of Jesus, and then briefly pray for them. You may like to use the structure below.

• Talk a little about how praying for your five is going? Are you finding it easy or hard? Do you manage to pray regularly or occasionally? What helps you to pray for them? How are you finding the prayer suggestions we offered back on session 1?

• Have you had any opportunities to show or share the faith with any of your five since session 5? With anyone else? If yes, use the first suggestion below.

Practice 2: Practise Faith Conversations

How have those opportunities gone? What went well? What didn't go so well and if you had a similar
conversation in the future, what might you do differently. Remember, we are trying to be SALTI in our
conversations.

- Or use one of the scenarios below.
 - 1. A family member shares they are going through a hard time: how to offer to pray with or for them.
 - 2. A colleague asks what you got up to over the weekend: how to own up that you go to church.
 - 3. A neighbour comments that they wish they had your faith: how to respond and perhaps invite someone to read a booklet, watch a video, or come to an event.
 - 4. An online contact notices you have made a change in your online posts (since becoming a Christian, although they don't know that is the reason why): how to speak of the difference Christianity has made in your life.
 - 5. At a social event a person you've just met asks 'what do you do?'
 - 6. A friend who is a parent and who brings their child to a parade service once a month: 'It's good for her to learn about right and wrong.'
 - 7. At a school governor's meeting, over coffee someone says to you: 'Why is the church so homophobic?'
 - 8. Travelling on a train reading a Christian book or Bible someone sits across from you and makes conversation: 'We buried my niece last week, she was only 14.'
